HAVE YOU TRIED "TPA"?

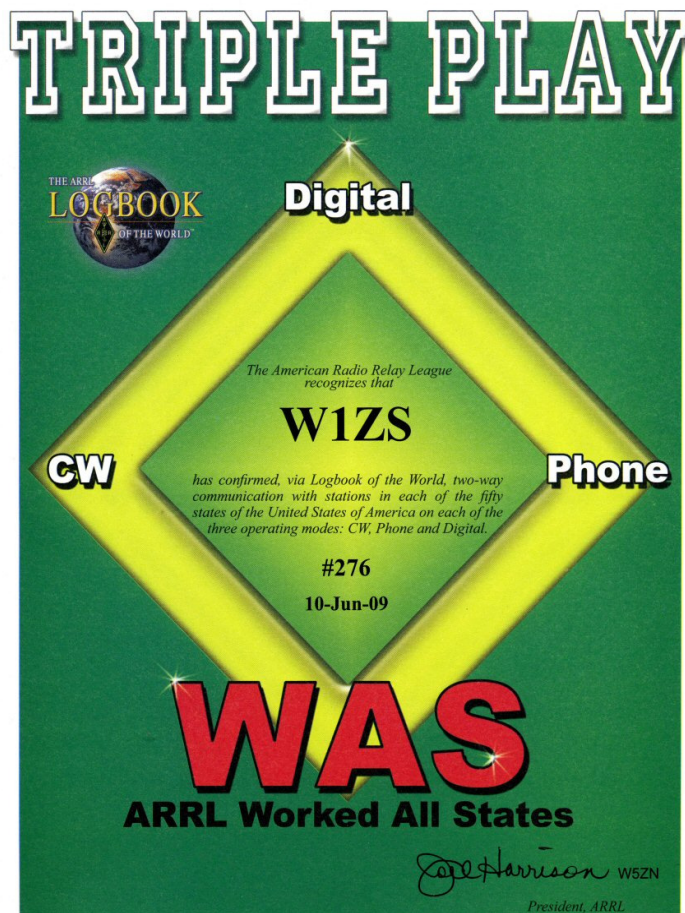
Having been a ham for more than fifty years, I have always been interested in working DX stations. Since my first DX qso in September, 1957 with DL4USA in Germany, I have chased DX. Having worked DXCC on 8 different bands and accumulated almost 100,000 qsos over the years I thought it was about time to try another challenge. I found that challenge in the TPA.

The TPA is the "Triple Play Award" sponsored by the American Radio Relay League. The requirements consist of working all 50 States on SSB, on CW and also on a digital mode (RTTY, PSK etc). From the East Coast of the US that can be a challenge for the last two states....Hawaii and Alaska. All the states can be worked on any band as long as the three modes are completed.

Surprisingly I found that qsos with Alaska and Hawaii were relatively easy on 20 meter CW and RTTY but more of a challenge on SSB. Actually, my last two needed states were Kentucky and Rhode Island. Using only 100 watts and often a dipole CW and RTTY are easier modes to get thru the QRM and QSB. I did use the K3UK website for many of the qsos. This website can be found at <http://www.obriensweb.com/sked/>. I recommend this site for not only the TPA award but for many awards as well as general qso and chat.

For this award one must use the Logbook of The World (LoTW). Information for this program can be found at <http://arrrl.org/lotw>. All confirmations of contacts are confirmed via the LoTW and therefore there is no need to send qsls via the mail. This means no cost for stamps, envelopes, etc. Also all confirmations are almost immediate. If one doesn't care about the TPA this is also a very good way to get the Worked all States (WAS) award for any band or all bands. On the K3UK website there is more information on other challenges as well as a place to schedule general chats with anyone using that site. Now that I have completed the TPA I may go back to chasing DX or maybe.....work some states on different bands or maybe even Slow Scan Television.....but that's a story for another day!!
